I am sorry to say that Districts 34B and 34C had to cancel their conventions due to the threat of Corona virus. MD34 State Convention has been canceled due to the threat of the Corona virus – COVID-19.

It is possible that we will not have the traditional, face-to-face, Multiple District 34 Convention this year, however, we are looking at other alternative methods to holding a person to person meeting. We are also working on alternative methods to conduct elections in districts 34B and 34C.

The Corona virus is not just a challenge for us in MD-34, but around the world. The ability to safely hold our constitutional-mandated district conventions due to the spread of the virus throughout the state was not feasible. The Council of Governors made a decision based on the information that we received from Lions Club International Legal Division, Alabama Department of Public Health and Center for Disease Control to cancel these events.

Governor Ivey has asked that there be no events with 50 or more


people in attendance. Locally, we were asked to not have meetings of more than 10 attendees. Due to the concern for our Lions and trying to follow the guidelines that are being provided to us by our local and state agencies, we had no choice but to cancel all Lions meetings and events.

Listen to the news so you can stay up to date on what is going on in your surroundings and buy essential items at the grocery store so you can stay in to help minimize the potential spread of the virus. Time is swiftly approaching for Lions on behalf of Alabama Lions Sight to contact their representatives and senators as our legislators consider the state budget to vote in favor of the Lions' request from the Education budget. Governor Ivey has included our proposal of screening grades 6, 8, and 10 in her budget at this time. We are working hard to keep it there and for it to be approved. If approved, our vision screening will increase by 170,000 students. Hopefully we will know something by May 1st in time for our 75th Anniversary celebration.

Let me encourage you to go to our website, <u>alsca.org</u>, and purchase your tickets for the anniversary gala. Tickets are \$50.00 a person and include two drink tickets, admittance to the silent auction, and dinner at the Hoover Country Club. Our Master of Ceremonies will be WBRC Fox 6 morning anchor Janice Rogers. A celebration of this magnitude only comes around once in a life time.

We are asking clubs to donate an item to be included in the silent auction that is unique to your club or area (beginning bid of \$25.00 and a suggested reserve bid for your item). All funds

raised will be earmarked for the purchase of a 2nd Mobile Eve Clinic vehicle.

In and Around the District

Hello District 34A Lions. Thank you so much for your support these past nine months. The District celebrated at the 34A 2020 convention last month and I could not have been prouder of our District. There were 50 in attendance on Friday evening, March 6 to celebrate Bits and Bytes and 81 in attendance on Saturday, March 8 for the main event and District Cabinet meeting. Our guest speaker International Director Justin Faber from Deckerville, Michigan was outstanding. As you are well aware, in every newsletter I have mentioned NAMI. When International Director Faber asked if anyone had heard about NAMI, almost every hand in the room went up. During this Lion year, I hoped that NAMI would become a household word and I think we are well on our way. Also during our session on Saturday, we elected our District Governor team for 2020-2021. Please give them your support as you have me this past year. Newly elected are Tim Sosebee District Governor Elect, Mechele Mosley, First Vice District Governor Elect and Mike McElhaney, Second Vice District Governor Elect. Congratulations to each of them and I wish them great success.

In our opening ceremony, we honored Lion LT. Col Renie Bright for her 33 years of military service. Lion Renie served in two tours of Iraq, and one each in Kuwait, Afghanistan and Kosovo. The American flag on display at the convention was flown over Kosovo and was presented to the Guntersville Lions Club honoring the club for their support to her when she was in Kosovo this past year. The Guntersville Lions supported the local golf team on her base and also the soldiers and children at the base during

During the convention the following presentations were given:

Joe Adair, District Food Bank Representative explained how the food bank operated in the area and how participants are selected. He reported that the food bank gives out more than 1000 boxes of food each month and several 1000 pounds of food to needy families in the surrounding community. During our convention, we collected \$250 and 78 cans of food for the District Food Bank.

Lion Richard Dean from the Hokes Bluff Lions made a presentation to ask for support for a Disaster Recovery trailer and equipment for our District. The cost of the trailer and equipment is around \$6000. Lion Richard reminded us that we will have a disaster in our District; it is just a matter of when. PDG and Alabama Lion Sight Executive Director Barry Elliott presented the latest news on our efforts to gain vision screening for all schools in the state of Alabama. It appears that PDG Barry's efforts are beginning to become a reality. There is a line item in the AL State Government Budget for \$1.7 million for Alabama Lions vision screening. It was reported that this number could even be greater. I would like to personally thank PDG Barry for his efforts.

Lion Tracy Thompson, District B reported on ALHSLF. The forum will take place Jun 19-21, 2020.

2nd VDG Brenda Elliott (District B) reported on our upcoming State Convention, which will be April 17—19.

LCIF State Chair, PDG Andy Marshall from District C made a request to support LCIF and received pledges of \$10,000 from those in attendance. I would like to thank our District for stepping up to the plate and supporting our foundation that has given so much back to us.

PCC Ron Seybold gave an update on Hometown Heroes filming and showed the first video that has been completed which was Moulton Lions Pizza Farm. It will be ready for distribution to social media very soon.

Lion Julie Drzewiecki gave the crowd an update on the newest testing available for diabetics, called Day Two and an update on type III diabetes.

The Global Service Team has asked me to remind you of our NAMI (North America Membership Initiative) 2020 events calendar. You can view the calendar on the district website at AlabamaLions34a.com. Please remember we are a pilot district for NAMI projects. Lions worldwide will be impacted by our outcomes which are dependent on the cooperation of every club in 34 A. Also, remember that the month of April will emphasize supporting an Environmental project.

As Lion Tim Carter reminded us, only 15 clubs in our district are reporting service hours. Reporting is so easy and very valuable as far as NAMI is concerned. Recently, four Lions from the Athens Club attended the online convention planning meeting and reported that they were able to us Mylion and in less than 60 seconds all service hours were entered. They all said service hours reporting has never been easier. The website home page has a link to the NAMI service page that will lead you Step by Step in reporting on Mylion. Failure to report gives the appearance that 34 A is lagging behind other districts in number for this year 28,000 people served while C has reported 35,000 and B has reported 48,000. If all of our clubs in District A were reporting, the comparisons would be much more favorable to our district. Please make



Readers and prescription glasses were dispensed. Every person who attended the clinic received a pair of sunglasses. Our team worked tirelessly to meet the needs of the people of Calvillo. Our team exemplified our motto 'We

Coronavirus disease (COVID-19) advice for the public

World Health Organization (WHO)

COVID-19 virus can be transmitted in areas with hot and humid climates

From the evidence so far, the COVID-19 virus can be transmitted in ALL AREAS, including areas with hot and humid weather. Regardless of climate, adopt protective measures if you live in, or travel to an area reporting COVID-19. The best way to protect yourself against COVID-19 is by frequently cleaning your hands. By doing this you eliminate viruses that may be on your hands and avoid infection that could occur by then touching your eyes, mouth, and nose.

Cold weather and snow CANNOT kill the new coronavirus

There is no reason to believe that cold weather can kill the new coronavirus or other diseases. The normal human body temperature remains around 36.5°C to 37°C, regardless of the external temperature or weather. The most effective way to protect yourself against the new coronavirus is by frequently cleaning your hands with alcohol-based hand rub or washing them with soap and water.

Taking a hot bath does not prevent the new coronavirus disease

Taking a hot bath will not prevent you from catching COVID-19. Your normal body temperature remains around 36.5°C to 37°C, regardless of the temperature of your bath or shower. Actually, taking a hot bath with extremely

hot water can be harmful, as it can burn you. The best way to protect yourself against COVID-19 is by frequently cleaning your hands. By doing this you eliminate viruses that may be on your hands and avoid infection that could occur by then touching your eyes, mouth, and nose.

The new coronavirus CANNOT be transmitted through mosquito bites.

To date there has been no information nor evidence to suggest that the new coronavirus could be transmitted by mosquitoes. The new coronavirus is a respiratory virus which spreads primarily through droplets generated when an infected person coughs or sneezes, or through droplets of saliva or discharge from the nose. To protect yourself, clean your hands frequently with an alcohol-based hand rub or wash them with soap and water. Also, avoid close contact with anyone who is coughing and sneezing.

Are hand dryers effective in killing the new coronavirus?

No. Hand dryers are not effective in killing the 2019nCoV. To protect yourself against the new coronavirus, you should frequently clean your hands with an alcohol-based hand rub or wash them with soap and water. Once your hands are cleaned, you should dry them thoroughly by using paper towels or a warm air dryer.

Can an ultraviolet disinfection lamp kill the new coronavirus?

UV lamps should not be used to sterilize hands or other areas of skin as UV radiation can cause skin irritation.

How effective are thermal scanners in detecting people infected with the new coronavirus?

Thermal scanners are effective in detecting people who have developed a fever (i.e. have a higher than normal body temperature) because of infection with the new coronavirus. However, they cannot detect people who are infected but are not yet sick with fever. This is because it takes between 2 and 10 days before people who are infected become sick and develop a fever.

Can regularly rinsing your nose with saline help prevent infection with the new coronavirus? No There is no exidence that regularly rinsing the regular than t

No. There is no evidence that regularly rinsing the nose with saline has protected people from infection with the new coronavirus.

There is some limited evidence that regularly rinsing nose with saline can help people recover more quickly from the common cold. However, regularly rinsing the nose has not been shown to prevent respiratory infections.

Can eating garlic help prevent infection with the new coronavirus?

Garlic is a healthy food that may have some antimicrobial properties. However, there is no evidence from the current outbreak that eating garlic has protected people from the new coronavirus.

Does the new coronavirus affect older people, or are younger people also susceptible?

People of all ages can be infected by the new coronavirus (2019-nCoV). Older people, and people with pre-existing medical conditions (such as asthma, diabetes, heart disease) appear to be more vulnerable to becoming severely ill with the virus.

WHO advises people of all ages to take steps to protect themselves from the virus, for example by following good hand hygiene and good respiratory hygiene.

Can spraying alcohol or chlorine all over your body kill the new coronavirus?

No. Spraying alcohol or chlorine all over your body will not kill viruses that have already entered your body. Spraying such substances can be harmful to clothes or mucous membranes (i.e. eyes, mouth). Be aware that both alcohol and chlorine can be useful to disinfect surfaces, but they need to be used under appropriate recommendations.

Do vaccines against pneumonia protect you against the new coronavirus?

No. Vaccines against pneumonia, such as pneumococcal vaccine and Haemophilus influenza type B (Hib) vaccine, do not provide protection against the new coronavirus. The virus is so new and different that it needs its own vaccine. Researchers are trying to develop a vaccine against 2019-nCoV, and WHO is supporting their efforts

Although these vaccines are not effective against 2019-nCoV, vaccination against respiratory illnesses is highly recommended to protect your health.

Are antibiotics effective in preventing and treating the new coronavirus?

No, antibiotics do not work against viruses, only bacteria.

The new coronavirus (2019-nCoV) is a virus and, therefore, antibiotics should not be used as a means of prevention or treatment.

However, if you are hospitalized for the 2019-nCoV, you may receive antibiotics because bacterial co-infection is possible.

Are there any specific medicines to prevent or treat the new coronavirus?

To date, there is no specific medicine recommended to prevent or treat the new coronavirus (2019-nCoV).

However, those infected with the virus should receive appropriate care to relieve and treat symptoms, and those with severe illness should receive optimized supportive care. Some specific treatments are under investigation, and will be tested through clinical trials. WHO is helping to accelerate research and development efforts with a range or partners.
