ALS Executive Director's Report

"I would rather walk with a friend in the dark, than alone in the light."

I continue to find the quotes attributed to Helen Keller filled with perception well beyond a person deprived of sight! This year has challenged each of us to rethink our perceptions. Family and friends have become even more significant and dear to us. As Lions, we develop close relationships with one another as we walk together, providing service to our communities.

Alabama Lions Sight has been walking together for 76 years providing vision care to residents of Alabama that could not afford it on their own. Since 1944, Lions have led the way of caring for the visual impaired. The imprint of Lions in Alabama began in local communities all over the state, but especially in Birmingham with Dr. Alston Callahan and what was to become the now UAB Callahan Eye Hospital. Here are a few highlights. Lions in the 1940's and 50's began partnering with Dr. Alston Callahan by operating on Alabama Lions sight patents free of charge in the Hillman Clinic building in Birmingham. In the 1960's the Eye Foundation Hospital was completed, and the Lions were granted office and exam spaces for its patients. In the 1970's the Lions raised the first \$150,000 of a million which was used to build the Clinic in the hospital. Lions paid for the hospital bill for Lion's patients and Dr. Austin Callahan did the surgeries free. In the 1990's when the hospital was sold to UAB, Dr. Callahan included in the contract that the Lions be granted space in the hospital in perpetuity. In 2008, the Lions and ALS raised \$70,000.00 to purchase a Pascal Laser for the Lions Clinic. The Lions raised \$30,000,00 of it in 30 days by Lions, UAB contributed \$10,000.00 and it was matched with a LCIF grant for \$40,000.00 for a total of \$\$80,000.00. In 2012, ALS contributed \$144,145.00 for equipment in the new Lions Clinic that was dedicated in 2014. This was a matching grant from LCIF of \$72,000.00 each. In 2017, ALS contributed \$150,000.00 for the new operating rooms of the hospital. This was a matching grant from LCIF with \$75,000.00 each.

In 2016 Alabama Lions Sight, walking together with the Lions of Alabama, began operating the Mobile Eye Clinic. Dr. Kent Daum was employed as our Optometrist to travel to rural Alabama providing complete eye care to date to more than 6,000 patients. As Lions, you are providing eye care to the uninsured and underinsured folks in 22 counties who do not have options for care, in most cases. Recently, when visiting the clinic, Dr. Daum saw a patient, who when examined, had a shadow on her fundus camera image. His diagnosis was melanoma. He very likely saved her life! Providing eye care, glasses, and saving lives are what Lions are providing through the Mobile Eye Clinic.

For more than two years, Ala-

bama Lions Sight has been aggressively pursuing the opportunity to screen the vision of children in every public school in Alabama. This effort has led to having the process to be changed from one agency, that has been given the state appropriation of nearly 3 million dollars each year for more than a decade. Now, anyone can bid for a proposal on a fair level playing ground. Alabama Lions Sight submitted a bid in October for the school year 2021-2022. Four bids were submitted, and the awarding bid will be announced by December 15, 2020. Lions, we will need a great


deal of friends walking together to provide vision screening to the children of Alabama! That would be a great Christmas gift for the children of Alabama!

Give MyLion a chance and you may find out it's easier than you think to get credit for your club's projects.

The importance of service projects for individual clubs cannot be minimized. Time and again, research has shown that members engaged in service remain members. Others are focused on member retention which is a goal for which we should all strive. Lions are no different from other service clubs in that we need to figure out how to stop the membership revolving door. Touchstone Story #4 taken from Lions Clubs International 'WE SERVE'

Lions adopted this simple motto in 1954 after an international contest among members.

Lions have both a slogan and a motto.

The slogan reflects the organization's formative years in America during and after World War I. The motto declares its common purpose in two short words.

In the early 1920s, the slogan "Liberty, Intelligence, Our Nation's Safety"—an acronym for the word Lions—appeared widely on club stationary, billboards and other promotional materials. Who said it first? Perhaps it was a young attorney named Halsted Ritter who rose to speak at the 1919 International Convention in Chicago.

"The name Lions stands not only for fraternity, good fellowship, strength of character and purpose," Ritter declared, "but, above all, the combination of L-I-O-N-S heralds to the country the true meaning of citizenship."

The words suited the patriotism that swept the U.S. following WWI, and Lions adopted the acronym as its slogan.

As the Lions movement grew across national borders, cultures, and languages, Lions began looking for other words to describe their mission and work. In 1954, the board announced an International Motto Contest and invit-



ed suggestions from all 522,000 worldwide members.

According to the entry form, the motto had to be "enduring," "international in character," and "easily translatable." There was also a strict contest rule to discourage wordiness. Lions could submit as many mottoes as they liked, but each entry could be no more than five words in length.

To get Lions thinking, the organizers gave out a few five-

word examples: "Men of Action in Action." "Working with Others for Others." "Worldwide Service to Humanity."

Thankfully, 11 of the 6,000 Lion contestants had better ideas. They each submitted identical entries. But Canadian Lion D. A. Stevenson from Fonthill, Ontario, was declared the winner as his submission had the earliest postmark. His motto contained two simple words: "We Serve."

Editor's Note:

It would be difficult to hear the word "respect" and not think of the late Aretha Franklin with her signature song "R-E-S-P-E-C-T, find out what it means to me". Respect is important by giving and receiving. So, how do we show respect for others as Lions? There are 6 elements to consider.

First, we **listen** to what another person has to say, everyone wants to feel that they are being listened to.

Second, we **affirm** someone by letting them know that they matter and that they are worthy of respect. An article from "A Conscious Rethink – How to Show Respect for Others" says "you may not respect every aspect of who they are and what they do, but you can give them appropriate respect at the level that affirms them".

Third, we **serve**. English-American poet W.H. Auden once said that, "We are all here on earth to help others". Lions show we care by serving and caring shows that we respect. Serving is important in showing respect.

Fourth, be **kind** because kindness matters. When we are kind to someone, we are giving of ourselves. Lions do this better than anyone else. But we should show kindness to "everyone" not just those we serve.

Fifth, be **polite**. Have you witnessed the decline of politeness in the world today? Whether it is on the highway, in stores, on social media – politeness is rapidly becoming a lost art. An act of politeness can literally change a person's day or even change their life.

Sixth, be **thankful**. "A Conscious Rethink – How to Show Respect for Others" says "when someone does something for your that's beneficial. Or they say something to you that's helpful in some way. Or they honestly affirm you in some way that's important to you. You should thank them". Being thankful is just another way we give respect and feel respected.

People don't like to be treated badly. They don't like to be demeaned, devalued, dishonored and disrespected. Without respect we lose heart. Everyone should receive respect by virtue of being a human being. Everyone wants respect. Everyone should show respect. So hopefully, everyone will receive the respect they are due and they will give the respect that is due to others.
