

### ALS Executive Director's Report

"Alone we can do so little; together we can do so much"

- Helen Keller

Lions know so well this quote from Helen Keller and actually see it unfold in life so often. Alabama Lions Sight (ALS) is proud to experience this reality at this time. Together, with Lions and partners, ALS is working hard to make a difference for the visually impaired in Alabama. As the leading provider of vision care for the indigent since 1944, more than 500,000 folks have received vision care through the generous service and donations of Lions.

Recently, ALS paid the copays of more than 90 indigent patients through the Lions Clinic at UAB Callahan Eye Hospital. These patients received vision care during the past year or more during the time of the pandemic. It truly is a wonderful service being provided by the Lions in partnership with the hospital.



Vision screening is opening back up with many screenings on the schedule to be completed. We are so glad that we are able to go back into schools and health fairs to screen. Please do not forget the private schools and day cares in your area to ask for a screening. We will be updating our Plusoptix hand held machines in the near future to better collect data and follow ups. Be looking out for an announcement to come to a certification meeting in the future!

The Mobile Eye Clinic (MEC) continues to do amazing work. Since its beginning in February of 2016, the clinic has seen more than 9,400 patients. ALS has many donors and sponsor partnerships that you will see in our newsletter. Without partners, this service would not be possible. Receiving funding from the state appropriation in Oc-

tober will allow ALS to advance with the addition of a second MEC adding the addition of hearing screening in our clinics. You will see in the photos of the new truck and chassis. In October, we will begin the process of lifting the box from our current truck and placing it on this new vehicle. The cost of refurbishing this truck should be around \$125,000. That process should take around a month once started. The new MEC is being outfitted to begin operation late fall but hopefully no later than January of 2023. A vehicle of this quality would cost new over \$500,000.00. PID Lowell Bonds happened to see this truck on line slated to be auctioned. We were able to bid and purchase it for \$69,000. Once we make a few modifications, we have about \$125,000.00 in this vehicle also. The equipment will run close to \$300,000,00. The cost of addition team of staff for the additional truck will take most of the remaining appropriation funds. Many clubs have made donations for this to become a reality!

The thing about all of this is that service will be doubled in 2023. The MEC is cur-

rently in 23 counties. In 2023, we plan to be in 46 counties! The patient count in the MEC for 2021 was 1721 and that has been our highest patient count thus far of any year! The additional truck will enable us to serve hopefully twice that many. Also, with the addition of hearing screening, we will be serving nearly that many as well with this important test. Very soon, we want to roll out a new opportunity for your club to help when the MEC

comes to your area by volunteering to help sign in patients with a new app for their appointment. This also will allow your club to engage in more service. This is such an exciting time, thank you for your service.







## Council of Governors Meeting Report of Alabama Lions Ophthalmic Mission to Mexico July 5, 2022

To the Council of Governors:

The 2022 Ophthalmic Mission to Papantla, Vera Cruz Mexico occurred during Feb 19-24, 2022. Glasses were shipped in December 2020 to Texas Lions Club. The glasses are being stored in Calvillo with the Calvillo Lions Club until 2022. The glasses have been transported from Calvillo to Papantla Lions Club. The glasses that were stopped at the border arrived in Vera Cruz Port February 24, 2022.

Twenty-six Lions participated on the mission team that arrived in Vera Cruz Saturday. The team assembled in Vera Cruz and traveled by bus to Papantla, Vera Cruz. The clinic was set up Sunday for the opening of the clinic. Over the four days, 1613 patients were seen. 79 referrals for surgery, 98 new glasses were made by an Alabama optometrist. (As of this

report, the glasses have not been shipped to Papantla to be distributed.) All Covid Protocols of Minister of Health Vera Cruz were followed during the mission. The Governor of the Totonaca People was very pleased and thankful for the work of our team with his people.

Our mission for 2023 is set for Vera Cruz, Vera Cruz February 20-23, 2023. The Vera Cruz Puerto Lions Club will be our sponsoring Lions Club. Dr. Conniff met with the club president to establish communication with the local club. The Moody Lions Club Eyeglass Recycling Center is working on the glasses for this year's mission.
